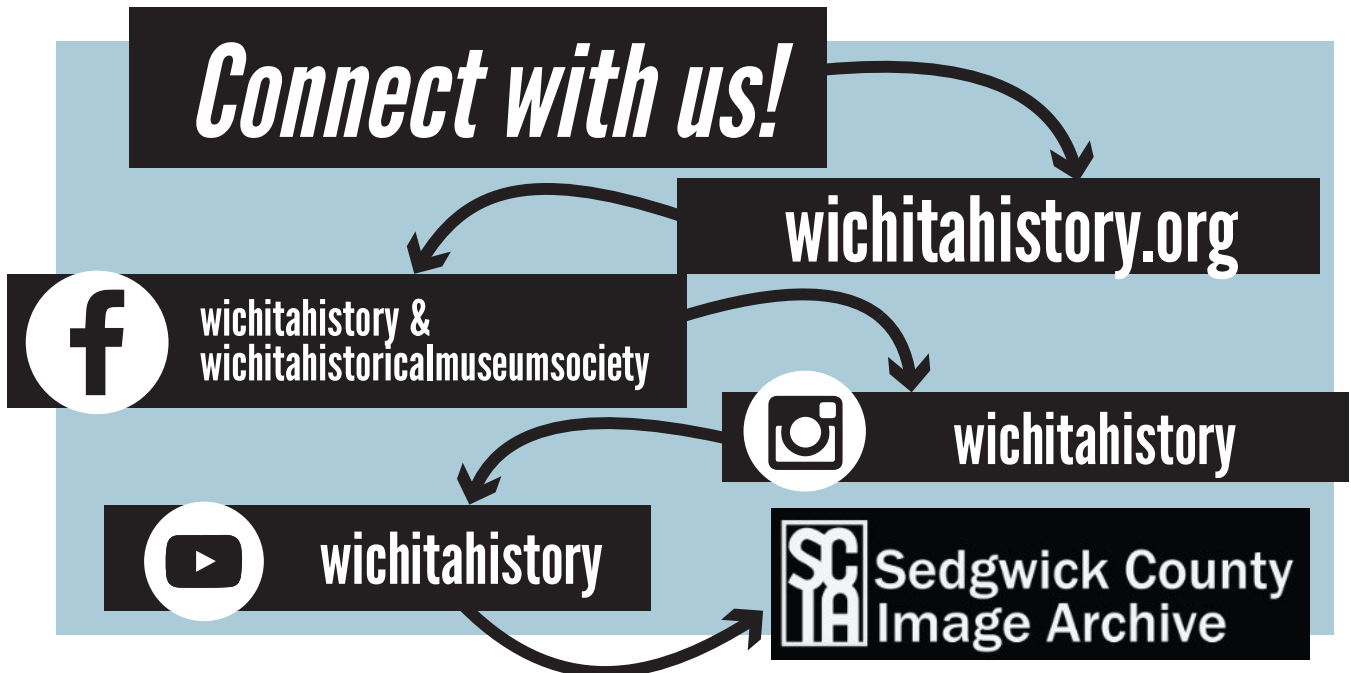

## Short-term exhibits currently on View:

**C.A. Seward – Windows on Collections**, 1st floor lobby – through October

Seward was an etcher, lithographer, block printer, and painter of international reputation. For years, he lived in Wichita as a career artist: creating logos and advertisement art for several local businesses, acting as director and instructor for the Southwestern School of Art, helping organize the Artist Guild, and forming the Prairie Printmakers, among many other ventures. His work is found in both private and public collections across the United States, including this Museum's permanent collection. ## Thrift Finds in the Museum Collection

This exhibit features objects discovered by Museum staff at local thrift stores. These items help us to tell the story of our community. Some of these notable finds include designs by Halston and Victor Costa, and Nehru jacket retailed by Henry's department store. Many of these artifacts are exhibited for the first time. ## Portraits From the Museum Collection

The desire to possess a visual representation of a specific person - a portrait - is present throughout history. A full range of artistic mediums are represented, each depicting a local resident. This exhibition continues the annual Lois Kay Walls Visual Art History Series. On view in the Lois Kay Walls Gallery on the Museum's 3rd floor and on view through 2025.

## Being Modern

This exhibition examines art and design found in everyday objects of the 1950s and 1960s, as it was experienced locally. On view through 2025 in the Slawson Gallery, 4th floor.

# Programs at the Museum

## Programs at the Historical Museum – free and open to the public

### Book Event – Sunday November 9, 2:00pm

#### Queen of Bohemia Predicts Own Death: Gilded-Age Journalist Zoe Anderson Norris.

Presented by author Eve M. Kahn, an independent scholar and regular contributor to The New York Times. This biography examines the life of a trailblazing journalist who took on New York’s Gilded Age injustices. Moving to Wichita in 1887, Zoe joined cultural groups for women, including the Hypatia Club, and taught art at Lewis Academy. She later wrote for magazines, as well as a gossip column for *The Wichita Eagle* under the pseudonym Nancy Yanks, before moving to New York City. Watermark Books will co-host this event with books available.

#### Story of a Wichita Neighborhood by Donna Rae Pearson

The story of a neighborhood is about gathering together to build a life – the people and the places they live, work, shop, and come together in community. Such stories also include establishing a place of significance in the greater community of the city. Historian Donna Rae Pearson explores the McAdams neighborhood, tracing its origins to Wichita’s earliest days. Donna Rae holds a Master’s degree in History from Wichita State University and specializes in Public History. She has worked as a museum specialist at the Kansas Historical Society and Local History Librarian at the Topeka & Shawnee County Public Library. She is a commissioner on the City of Topeka’s Local Landmarks Commission and a board member for ArtsConnect located in Topeka.

# Little Black Dress at 100

*Little Black Dress at 100* – on view at the Wichita Art Museum through November 30, featuring dresses from the Wichita-Sedgwick County Historical Museum collection.

The exhibition is co-organized by the Wichita Art Museum, The Wichita-Sedgwick County Historical Museum, and Kansas State University’s Historic Costume and Textile Museum, under the direction of their curators Dr. Tera Lee Hedrick, Jami Frazier Tracy and Marla Day, respectively.

For nearly 100 years, a single garment – the little black dress – has stood at the heart of women’s fashion. Since Vogue magazine declared Coco Chanel’s little black dress “the frock that all the world will wear” in 1926, it has captured the fashion world’s imagination. The little black dress—affectionately known as the LBD—has evolved every year and every decade to respond to changes in style and culture. In honor of the upcoming 100th anniversary of Coco Chanel’s groundbreaking little black dress, *Little Black Dress at 100* features LBDs drawn from the collections of the Wichita-Sedgwick County Historical Museum and the K-State Historic Costume and Textile Museum, on view at the Wichita Art Museum. The exhibition showcases examples by high-end designers as well as affordable, everyday versions, all worn by Kansas women.

This extraordinary exhibition features a contemporary garment commissioned for the Wichita-Sedgwick County Historical Museum. Wichita textile artist Nina Winter – who uses her designs to create characters and tell stories that explore the past, present, and future – created a LBD with a detachable, sequined collar that represents a Samurai warrior in 1890s Japan. Winter says that “a Samurai warrior, torn between worlds, liminal spaces, and multiple timelines, constructs a magical cloak/

shield for safety... This armor is handmade with sequins (representing eyes and visions), elbow pads (shaped as two teardrops) and square osode shoulders (traditional Samurai armor). It is armor we all wear to protect our hearts from pain and suffering, not realizing it is inevitable and a gateway to true divinity and Nirvana.” Winter’s imaginative, historically-inspired take on the LBD speaks to the form’s endless possibilities and the Historical Museum is honored to have this work as part of our Permanent Collection. 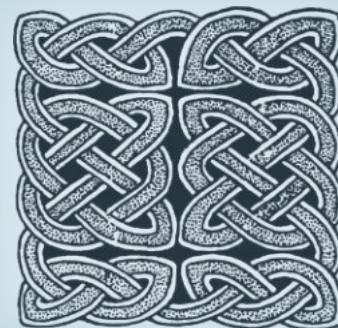

## Education News

The Museum's educators, Samantha Carter and Cynthia Martinez-Woelk, lead in the design and execution of programming for audiences, young and old. This is accomplished with the help of volunteer staff acting as docents and gallery guides. This year's efforts have included 10 Senior Wednesday programs and tours, 26 school tours, 2 individual museum-based student projects, school break programs, and several off-site presentations.



The Museum also serves the Kansas State Department of Education as a regional location for the National Council for History Education learning events, where history teachers meet to gain knowledge in their profession.

With guidance from the Education team, this year's group is ready to do it again!



## Supporting Student Historians

Friends University and the Museum sponsor our region's participation in the National History Day competition. The competition engages hundreds of area students by challenging them to interpret history through the creation of exhibits, video documentaries, website design, essay writing, and dramatic performance. Twelve projects from Region 6 received recognition at the State competition, and two of those at the National in Washington D.C. This year's theme was *Rights and Responsibilities in History*.

The Museum gave special recognition to students whose projects were drawn from local history

The Museum hosted the 15th annual DeVore Essay Contest, where secondary students submitted essays using the year's National History Day theme with a local topic. We received more submissions for the contest than ever before, and love seeing students excited about local history. Next year's theme will be *Revolution, Reaction, Reform in History*,

- Middle School 2nd Place: St. Joseph Catholic School – Olive Ann Beech: Rights and Responsibilities in Wichita

## THE IMPORTANCE OF YEAR-END GIVING WITH AN ANNUAL GIFT

Your support of the Historical Museum, through membership is appreciated. If at the end of the year you can help further – thank you again! The Museum’s annual gift appeal is an essential source of funding for the Museum in the coming year. These gifts support the Museum’s unique mission to educate the community and its visitors about Wichita and Sedgwick County history from a world-class museum setting. Please be a part of next year’s success with an yearend gift. The appeal letter will be sent soon. Your gift to the Museum, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, is typically considered a tax-deductible donation.

### IF YOU ARE 70 1/2, PLAN A QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DEDUCTION GIFT FROM YOUR TRADITIONAL INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNT (IRA) IN 2025.

Federal law allows people age 70½ or older to make direct transfers up to \$108,000 per year per person to charitable organizations from their Individual Retirement Account (IRA), without the withdrawal being treated as taxable income. The payment from your Traditional IRA must be made directly by the IRA Trustee. You cannot personally touch the money.

The withdrawal can also be counted toward your Required Minimum Distribution.

The advantages are that many of us cannot take advantage of charitable deductions. This is because of the high standard deduction (\$31,400 for seniors filing jointly). Paying the donation directly out of your IRA lets you take advantage of this tax deduction by instead reducing your adjusted gross income by the amount donated. Reducing Adjusted Gross Income has other potential tax benefits as well.

Please visit with your tax accountant to see if this would help you.
